

~ סְפָּרִים קְדוֹשִׁים ~

~ Holy Books and Religious Objects ~

We have been discussing laws regarding the holiness of the בּית-בְּנֶטֶת. (holy books) and other religious articles must also be given proper respect. Here are some laws relating to this:

- Some should not sit on a chair or bench on which סְבַּרִים קְדוֹשִׁים are lying.
- All סְבְּרִים קְדוֹשִׁים, including those that are worn out or torn, and sheets of paper on which Torah thoughts were written, may not be thrown out. They must be put in a גְּנִייָּה (a special burial place). Many synagogues have a special box or place where these books and papers are set aside until they are taken for burial.
- א Holy books must not be placed face down. If one sees a מֶבֶּר קָדוֹשׁ that is face down he should turn it over on to its right side.
- 🤝 A רּנְטָשׁ, or one of the five parts of the רּוּנְשׁ, may be placed on top of a volume of נְבִיאִים or כְּתוּבִים and בְּנִיאִים may be placed on top of each other; נְבִיאִים and בְּנִיאִים may not be placed on top of בתוּבִים or יְבִיאִים may not be placed on top of בתוּבִים or בְּתוּבִים may not be placed on top of any of these יִחְנָּשִׁים. Other holy books must not be placed on top of any of these
- Papers which do not have any holiness or religious meaning at all must not be inserted in שפרים קדוֹשִׁים unless they help in the study of the books.
- A person who was studying from a holy book should not leave the book open when he leaves, even if he expects to return in a short time.
