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Summary of the צֶּרִשָּׁה, by אֲלִיוֹת

ה' did not lead the אֶרֶץ יִשְׂרָאֵל by the most direct route to אֶרֶץ יִשְׂרָאֵל. This would have taken them by way of the פְּלִשְׁתִּים and ה' said "perhaps the people will change their minds when they see a war and they will return to מִצְרַיִם."

took the bones of יוֹסֵף, as יוֹסֵף had requested. ה' sent a pillar of cloud to lead them by day and a pillar of fire by night. ה' hardened the heart of פַּרְעֹה and he chased after בָּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל.

בּרֵעֹה became very frightened as they saw פַּרְעֹה and his horsemen and army coming towards them. מִצְרִיִם said: "...it is better that we should serve מִצְרִיִם than that we should die in the wilderness." מֹשֶׁה told the people that they should not fear and that they would soon see 'ה perform a great מֵּס for them.

ה' instructed מֹשֶׁה to lift up his staff and stretch out his arm over the יַם-סוּף in order to split it. מִשָּה did this and ה' moved the sea with a strong east wind all night. בְּנֵי walked within the sea on dry land and the water was like a wall to their right and left. מִצְרַיִם chased after them. ה' removed the wheels from the Egyptian chariots and caused them to drive with difficulty.

משֶׁה said to מֹשֶׁה: "Stretch out your hand over the sea and the water will go back upon Egypt, upon its chariots and upon its horsemen." משֶׁה did so and the sea came back upon the whole Egyptian army, while בָּי יִשְׂרָאֵל continued to walk on dry land, with the water as a wall on their right and their left.

Shemos 14, 30,31: "On that day ה' saved יִשְׂרָאֵל from the hand of מִצְּרָיִם and saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great hand that ה' inflicted upon Egypt and the people feared ה' and they had faith in ה' and in מֵשֶׁה עֲבַדוֹ - Moshe, His servant."

then sang a שִּירָה to praise and thank 'ה for saving them. [In shul this is sung by the בַּעַל קְרִיאָה to a special tune]. מָרְיָם led the women in song and dance with drums.

At מָרָה the people complained that the water was too bitter to drink. 'ה showed מֹשֶׁה a tree, which מֹשֶׁה threw into the water to sweeten it.

The people complained again. 'ה told מֹשֶׁה that He was going to rain down לֶחֶם מִן־הַשָּׁמָיִם - bread (or 'food') from heaven. The people should collect each day's portion on its day and a double portion on אֵרֶב שַּׁבָּת.

קין provided אָלָי - quail (for its meat) in the evening and מָן in the morning. There was a layer of dew both beneath and over the מָן. [This is why we have a board under our challos and a cloth covering them.] The people had to collect two portions on עֶרֶב שַׁבָּת - one portion for עֶרֶב שַׁבָּת and the other for מַשָּב not to go collecting the שַׁבָּת on סָּן. On other days if it was left over until the next morning it became wormy and stank. Some people went out to look for שֲבָּת on שָבָּת but there was none to find. מִשְׁה to put some שִׁ in a jar, to be kept for future generations. אַרְרָ כִּנען in the אַרְבִי יִשְּׂרָאֵל.

In רְפִידִים the people complained again that they had no water. 'ה told מֹשֶׁה to strike a rock to bring water out of it. מְּלֵינָה called the place מְּפֶה וֹמְרִיבָה had quarreled (מְרִיבָה) and because they had tested (מְרִיבָה), "...because בְּיֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל among us or not?"

עֶמְלֵק came and battled with בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל When מֹשֶׁה raised his hands יִשְׂרָאֵל was stronger and when he lowered them אֲמָלֵק was stronger. His arms became tired and he was given a stone to sit on. Then אַהָרן supported his hands from each side.

We may ask why the תּוֹרָה tells us exactly when עֲמֶלֵק attacked יִשְׂרָאֵל. explains the answer with a מַשֵּׁל from the בַּתְּרָשׁ:

A man put his son on his shoulders and went out on a journey. Each time the boy saw something he wanted he said how much he liked it and his father gave it to him. This happened a second and a third time. Soon, the boy (who was still on his father's shoulders) asked a passer-by, "Have you seen my father?" Annoyed, the father said, "Don't you know where I am!?" He threw his son to the ground, where he was bitten by a dog.

(Midrash Tanchuma and Shemos Rabboh)

So, too, after all the בְּסִים - miracles Hashem showed בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל they had the cheek to wonder whether He was with them! Can you explain the close connection between the מְשֵׁל and pesukim 7 and 8?
